

SHINING A SPOTLIGHT ON RURAL COMMUNITY NEEDS

Shining a Spotlight on Rural Community Needs Report – May 2023









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Introduction

In collaboration with key stakeholders, Northamptonshire Community Foundation has carried out a comprehensive investigation into the pressing challenges experienced by rural communities in Northamptonshire. This report aims to shed light on the critical issues of rural poverty, food insecurity, and limited access to essential services. By presenting the stories and statistical insights shared by residents, as well as data from our partners Local Insight (OCSI) and surveys conducted by Northamptonshire ACRE, we seek to raise awareness and inspire action to address the hardships faced by rural Northamptonshire and build a dedicated funding programme to help address some of these issues.

Understanding Rural Poverty

Rural poverty is a stark reality that deeply impacts the lives of individuals and communities, manifesting in financial constraints, limited access to resources, and isolation. In this report, we focus on towns, villages, and hamlets with populations below 10,000, where the challenges are particularly pronounced.









Key Challenges and Findings

Cold Homes and Health Implications

Cold homes contribute to respiratory conditions, cardiovascular diseases, poor mental health, dementia, and slower recovery from injuries.

Rural households have a higher likelihood of lacking access to a vehicle, making it challenging to reach essential services.

Residents of Silverstone Village, for example, must travel over an hour (via public transport) to access a GP and approximately 100 minutes to reach a hospital.

Food Insecurity and Higher Prices

In 2020, Northamptonshire ACRE found that 45% of rural residents experienced higher food prices due to their rural location.

Approximately 22% of respondents with children reported the likelihood of missing a meal.

Lack of access to basic goods, such as baby milk and dairy/gluten-free products, further exacerbates the challenges faced by rural residents.











Limited Awareness and Access to Support

Around 60% of rural residents are unsure how to access support in their community, with only 9% mentioning food banks.

Lack of regular public transport, combined with up to 28% having no access to a car, hinders residents from accessing support services.



Financial hardship was mentioned by 40% of respondents when asked about the causes of food poverty in their community.

Unique Factors Impacting Different Demographics

Older people highlighted transportation challenges preventing them from reaching shops, while those with school-aged children mentioned financial hardship and the cost of food as contributing factors to poverty. Rural residents in affluent areas may be less likely to seek help when in need.











Population and Deprivation

Rural areas in Northamptonshire are home to 31.4% of the overall population (237,815 people), with an older population compared to urban areas.

The indices of deprivation reveal income deprivation affecting more than 14,000 people in rural Northamptonshire.

Working-age residents claiming DWP benefits, children in low-income families, and pensioners with low income are significantly represented in rural areas.

Cost of Living and Fuel Poverty

Fuel poverty affects 11.5% of households in rural Northamptonshire (over 11,000 households).

Domestic buildings with low energy efficiency ratings are more prevalent in rural areas, contributing to higher fuel poverty rates.

Food insecurity is also higher in rural areas, with a greater vulnerability score compared to urban areas.











Health and Education

Rural areas have a higher proportion of residents with limiting long-term illnesses, and accessing healthcare services poses challenges due to longer travel times.

Over 14,300 adults in rural Northamptonshire have no formal qualifications.

Rural areas experience longer travel times to educational institutions, making access to education more difficult.

Transportation and Connectivity

Rural areas have greater road distances to key services, such as GPs and schools.

Poor digital connectivity is prevalent in rural neighbourhoods, with higher proportions of premises having broadband speeds below the Universal Service Obligation.

Lack of car ownership is a significant issue in some rural areas, limiting access to essential services.

Economy and Employment

Rural areas face challenges related to lower job density and longer travel times to employment centres.









Approximately 17.3% of all residents claiming unemployment benefits in Northamptonshire are living in rural areas.

Certain rural neighbourhoods, such as Finedon, Rothwell, and Irthlingborough, have a higher proportion of unemployment benefit claimants.

Case Studies

These are a few examples of projects based in rural areas across Northamptonshire that have previously benefitted from funding from Northamptonshire Community Foundation.

Crick Allotment Society Ltd

Awarded £1,500.00 from the Yelvertoft Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund to expand the existing mains water supply.

"This grant has made a significant difference to the

Crick Allotment plot holders as the primary beneficiaries, but also to their families, many of whom also benefit from the opportunity to work on and enjoy their family members plots, but also from the produce.

The grant has made a significant difference to those with limited mobility and our older plot holders, many of whom have already reported how much easier it is to manage watering themselves."

Burton Latimer Town Council – Burton Latimer Community Managed Library

Awarded £30,000.00 from the Burton Wold Wind Farm Fund to support the running costs of the library which provides a range of services for residents and as a venue for other community groups.

"The grant has allowed us to continue to create a



community hub in Burton Latimer. We have been able to work with groups providing mobility support, economic support, and emotional support. The grant has allowed us to focus on the needs of Burton Latimer residents and enabled us to bring local community groups, organisations, and businesses together. This was evident when we hosted a recent Job Fair where local business and job seekers attended. Working with DWP and local employers we met over 80 local job seekers."











SNVB

Awarded £1,715.92 from the Family Food Aid Fund to provide supplies for breakfast and after school clubs at schools across South Northants and Daventry, supporting pupils at schools who are struggling to eat breakfast before attending school.



"The grant supported 30 children who were attending school having not eaten breakfast and their ability to concentrate was severely impacted. Our provision of breakfast and after school food boxes improved the position significantly."

Wind Farm Funds

The Wind Farm Funds support a variety of educational, environmental, charitable, and general community amenity projects for several communities, located in the areas of Burton Wold, Yelvertoft, Winwick and New Albion. Northamptonshire Community Foundation is the fund's independent administrator.

Examples of Wind Farm-Funded projects

Organisation	Amount awarded	Project
Yelvertoft Pre-School	£1,325	To upgrade the old and worn bikes and trikes at pre-school with new ones specifically designed for pre- school children and that help with Early Years development
Clubs for Young People Northamptonshire	£6,900	To establish a fortnightly youth club in the Crick area to serve the young people in Yelvertoft and surrounding villages
Yelvertoft Parish Council	£17,898	To fence one boundary, renew an entrance gate and restore a second historic entrance enabling easier access to the Allotment Field for the King Georges field
Crick Scarecrow Festival Committee	£2,000	To fund costs of this year's Scarecrow and Music Festival
